Follow the Leader Mr. Barnett Goldman

Grades 8-10

Leadership comes in all sizes, shapes, and ages. It may just be semantics, but is there a difference between being a Jewish leader versus a leader who is Jewish? Participants in this unique course will learn the nuts and bolts of what historical leaders, our ancestors, and our role models might say it takes to be a Jewish leader. We will grapple together with the following questions: How are 21st Century teens in America, and all over the world, prepared to be leaders in their communities? Are there differences between how leadership is perceived in our youth vs. adults? Is Jewish leadership different from American leadership? Come hone your leadership skills that can be used in your Jewish community and in your everyday community by learning how to lead a discussion, manage your time, and deal with conflict resolution. There will be opportunities for debates, creative work, and possible guests. This is a class for those who want to have their voices heard!!

That Was the Week that Was Mr. Bruce Prince

Grades 8-10

Not a week goes by without a history making moment, and there are dozens of news reporting agencies that will report on it. However, they all seem to see a different angle of the same news event. A wise man used to say, "There are three parts to every story: Yours, mine, and the third that is usually somewhere in between." Are there journalists that can provide an unbiased report? How do so many world events involve Israel? We'll learn how to sift through the layers of truthiness and develop an appreciation for truth, justice, and the American way.

Headlines: Halachic Debates of Current Events Rabbi Gary Hoffman

Grades 10-12

Students will take items drawn from news articles as starting points for in-depth analysis of questions at the forefront of both American and Jewish law and ethics. Our discussion will cover issues over six categories: Society, Family, Israel, Shabbat & Holidays, Kashrut and Business. Some of the topics we will address deal directly with Jewish life and Israeli concerns; others discuss recent events, technological developments, and political situations. Our topics directly impact the everyday lives of contemporary Jews.

How (and Why) Judaism Changed in Modern Times Rabbi Dr. David J. Fine

Grades 10-12

Continuing our study of modern Jewish history from the fall semester, this course will involve a close reading of primary sources showing the different ways that Jews responded to the challenges of Emancipation and Enlightenment in the nineteenth century. How did Reform, Conservative and Orthodox Judaism begin? (One does not need to have taken the fall semester course first.)

Ecology and Environmentalism Rabbi Gary Hoffman

Grades 8-10

With careful looking, you will find within the sources presented solace, support, and hopefully further inspiration in your quest to protect our planet.

Love at first sight? Perfection? Music is one of the greatest outlets and pleasures we have. It also contains many ideas and themes for us to learn from. We'll listen to popular artists and have interesting and interactive Jewish discussions!

Jewish-Infused Improvisation - Black Box Studios

Grades 8-12

Students in this hands-on, on-your-feet workshop learn collaborative improvisation skills based on their varying levels of experience, under the guidance of Black Box Studios' professional working Teaching Artist, Ilana Schimmel and in collaboration with BB's Artistic Director - and a longtime BCHSJS instructor - Matt Okin. Fully fleshed out scenes - both short form and long form improv - are created not from scripts, but from Jewish themes, personalities, and ideas that are introduced at the start of each session. If health protocols allow, performance opportunities could be offered for the community and peers at the end of the semester. Suitable for all grade levels.

Science and Technology

What are the moral considerations of self-driving cars? According to Jewish Law, can I clone myself? And if I did, would the new "me" be considered Jewish? If I travel to space, do I have to keep Shabbat? If the Torah makes no reference to extraterrestrial life, does that mean that it does not exist? We're going to explore how Judaism gives us new perspectives on today's scientific and technological advancements. While these questions may seem theoretical now, they may become relevant sooner than we think!

Equality for All Bruce Prince

Grades 10-12

We will be learning about the origins of American slavery, horrendous mistreatment, lack of empathy and inhumane conditions forced upon our early settlers. We will trace the evolvement of institutional racism, the Emancipation Proclamation and the horrors of Jim Crow Laws and how they evolved through a Jewish lens. We'll continue through mistreatment, lynching and the evolvement of Civil Rights. We'll also highlight Jewish involvement in the NAACP, Sears Roebuck (The predecessor of Amazon) and the circuitous pathway of Henry Ford. Lots to discuss, and film clips to view.
